Topic: How did Technology in Britain change from the Stone Age to the Iron Age?

## **Background understanding**

Prehistory in Britain began with the arrival of groups of hunter-gatherers from further south in Europe around 900,000 years ago and ended with the Roman invasion in AD43. During this huge amount of time, humans developed from hunter-gatherers moving around a sparse country, to people who erected great monuments, which still survive today. Prehistory is usually divided into three periods; the Stone Age, the Bronze Age and the Iron Age. These periods are named after the materials used to make tools and weapons. The Stone Age is also subdivided into three periods: Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic.
