## **Background understanding**

The period is considered to have begun with the raiding of Lindisfarne in 793. Vikings were largely from Denmark, Norway and Sweden and it is not known for certain why they began to raid other lands and settle in places such as England. Within a century Vikings had taken over large parts of the land in northern England, although failed to over-rule the large kingdom of Wessex. By 884, after years of battles, a treaty was agreed that left Vikings ruling over 'Danelaw' in the north of England. The Vikings arrived in longships which were designed for raiding and quick getaways. They also travelled far distances to trade. It is thought they were the first Europeans to discover North America.
