KS1 Judaism – The Torah

Key Vocabulary

Judaism: one of the oldest monotheistic (belief in one god) religions

Jew: person who can trace their ancestry back to through the ancient people of Israel to Abraham

Torah: means 'teaching'. The Torah Scrolls contain the first 5 books of the Hebrew Bible

Sabbath: a day of religious observation from Friday evening to Saturday evening

Synagogue: Jewish place of worship

Rabbi: a teacher of Jewish law, or religious leader

Law: a system of rules

Moses: the most important Jewish prophet. He received the 10 commandments from God and led the Israelites out of Egypt

Hebrew: language spoken by the descendants of Abraham

Mezuzah: a parchment inscribe with religious texts attached to the doorpost in Jewish homes





Torah

The **Torah** is the **law** of God as revealed to **Moses**. It contains the first 5 books of the **Hebrew** Bible and it teaches **Jews** what God is like and how to live their lives.

Jewish people treat the **Torah** with great respect and it is read each week in the **synagogue**. The **Torah** is written in **Hebrew**, by hand, onto a parchment scroll and kept in a decorated case. A special pointer, called a yad, is used to follow the text.

Over one year, the whole **Torah** is read and celebrated on the Jewish holiday of Simchat **Torah**. This marks the annual cycle of public reading of the **Torah**.

The synagogue

Jews meet in a **synagogue** for religious worship and instruction.

Inside a **synagogue**, you will find an ark, where the **Torah** scrolls are kept, an eternal light and a bimah, a platform from where the **Torah** is read.

Jewish people go to the **synagogue** to worship and to study. They are community buildings where Jewish people can go to meet each other and take part in different events. When they are in the **synagogue**, they can feel closer to God and to each other.

Religious services are led by a rabbi.





The Sabbath

Sabbath is the fourth commandment, 'You shall remember to keep the Sabbath day Holy'. It remembers the seventh day when God rested after creating the world.

It takes place every Friday evening at sunset and ends on Saturday evening. During **Sabbath**, Jewish people are not allowed to work or even do homework!

On Friday evening they celebrate with a special meal. They have two loaves of Challah bread, wine shared in a Kiddush cup and light Sabbath candles. Special blessings are recited and songs are sung. The families will visit the synagogue during Sabbath.
